A Festival Choral Evensong In Celebration of the 135th Anniversary of the Consecration of the Memorial Chapel of the Good Shepherd

Tuesday, October 24, 2023 5:30 P.M.

The President, Deans, Faculty, Staff, Board of Trustees, Students, Alumni, and Friends of The General Theological Seminary extend a warm welcome to you on this joyous occasion: the 135th anniversary of the consecration of the Memorial Chapel of the Good Shepherd.

Upon its consecration on October 23, 1888, Presiding Bishop John Williams of Connecticut placed this Chapel under the "spiritual jurisdiction" of all the Bishops of The Episcopal Church, intending it to serve as a center for worship, prayer, and formation for the whole Church.

The Chapel was designed by renowned New York City architect Charles C. Haight, the son of The Rev. Benjamin Haight (class of 1831 and organizing Rector of St. Peter's Chelsea). Haight considered the Chapel of the Good Shepherd to be the crowning achievement of his career. With its 166-foottall tower modeled after the Chapel of Magdalen College, Oxford, and its soaring wooden ceiling inspired by Chapel of Keble College, Oxford, it was a faithful interpretation of an old-world collegiate chapel, designed and built for a Seminary of New York's Gilded Age.

Located in the spiritual and geographical heart of the Close, few places in the United States more powerfully evoke the mystery of Ordination than the Chapel of the Good Shepherd. Along the central aisle, and dividing the altar from the nave, are three sets of virtues - classical, Christian, and theological - all of which are cultivated in candidates for Holy Orders through regular prayer and worship. Inscribed on the chapel walls is the ordination prayer from John Durel's 1670 Latin Translation of the 1662 Prayer Book (translated by Durel into Latin for use in collegiate chapels): "Receive the Holy Ghost for the office and work of a Priest in the Church of God, now committed unto thee by the imposition of our hands..." These words are as a perpetual reminder to worshippers of the sacred ministry to which they have been called.

An initial \$125,000 gift for the construction of the Chapel of the Good Shepherd was generously donated by Dean Eugene August Hoffman's mother, Mrs. Glorvina Rossell Hoffman, in memory of her recently deceased husband Samuel Verplanck Hoffman. As we mark the 135th anniversary of this Chapel's dedication, we pause to reflect on the generous spirit that made this sacred space possible. Then, as now, the Seminary relies on the support of its alumni and friends. In celebration of this significant milestone, we humbly ask for your continued generosity to uphold this treasure of The Episcopal Church, so that another century of Christian leaders might be nurtured under the loving gaze of the Good Shepherd.
