Christ Church Cathedral is a place open to all God's people. Our Cathedral is the seat our Bishops and a spiritual home for all Episcopalians in Connecticut. Our Cathedral has an active ministry and presence in the City of Hartford.

The Cathedral's four congregations represent a diverse, inclusive, multi-cultural and multi-lingual community coming from the Greater Hartford Area, both the city and suburbs. Our Cathedral was founded in 1762. Our building was erected/ consecrated in 1828 and set apart as the Cathedral of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut in 1919.

The City enjoys a rich cultural history; a vibrant ethnically diverse and civically engaged population; and civic institutions. The Episcopal Church in Connecticut (ECCT) is the oldest organized diocese in The Episcopal Church. It formally began with the consecration of the Rt. Rev. Samuel Seabury as Bishop of Connecticut on November 14, 1784 in Aberdeen, Scotland. Today, ECCT is one of the most innovating, creative and collaborative community within the Episcopal Church.
